

HOLMES CHAPEL SCOUTS

The Scout group in Holmes Chapel have been teaching young people skills for life since 1926. Each week we have about 150 young people between the ages of 6 and 14 who take part in a wide variety of activities and challenges as they learn new skills and gain badges.



At the beginning of the year, we excitedly looked forward to a wonderful mix of camps along different themes; seeing the delight on the faces of our members as they camp for the first time, sleep in hammocks under the stars, toast marshmallows around a campfire, climb mountains, sail on lakes, undertake nature walks, learn to climb on our climbing wall, target sports like archery, bike rides, team challenges, survival skills as well as craft activities such as making cards and junk modelling. The highlight of the year was to be a 10 day trip to the International Scout Centre in Kandersteg, Switzerland.

Instead, this has been a great year for our leaders to learn new skills in how to run Scouting sessions using video conferencing tools and being ingenious in finding activities that our young people can do at home under lockdown.

During April, we took part in a Camp at Home challenge and had over 100 of our members make dens and shelters at home to sleep in – some camped every night in April. We've done various activities such as made cakes and pizza, played bingo, run quizzes and completed scavenger hunts. We have also had loads of badges completed at home with activities such as learning to ride and look after your bike, helping at home with cooking and cleaning, growing vegetables in the garden.

Trefoil Guild is a branch of Girlguiding and Jodrell Trefoil Guild is the local group and includes ladies from Holmes Chapel, Goostrey, Kermincham, Knutsford and Chelford. Under normal circumstances we meet monthly to enjoy talks, outings, games

evenings, walks, lunches out and general chats (always accompanied by cake). During the current pandemic our meetings have been very restricted but people have kept in touch by phone and emails and the picture shows a 'socially distanced' afternoon tea in a member's garden.

A brief history of The Trefoil Guild:

1909 Girls appeared at the first Boy Scout Rally at the Crystal Palace, demanding to be allowed to join the movement.

1910 The Girl Guides Association was formed.

1920 Ex-Guides began to form unofficial groups with the purpose of maintaining contact with their old Guide companies.

1935 An organisation named 'Old Guides' was formed.

1943 The Girl Guides Association amalgamated the various groups of 'Old Guides' and the name 'Trefoil Guild' was adopted.

1952The Trefoil Guild, while remaining part of the guiding movement, was given recognition as a self-governing, self-financing body and became responsible for former Guides in the United Kingdom and overseas territories.

1971 The minimum age for membership of the Trefoil Guild was lowered to 18 from 21.

1984 A resolution was passed to admit men into The Trefoil Guild.



THE BEES SAY GOODBYE TO JODRELL BANK

Not only people fall victim to Covid-19! Jodrell Bank opened its doors to visitors again after lockdown on August 22nd but sadly the Arboretum will be minus its apiary. Before you start worrying about the bees – they didn't get Covid, they are more or less as fine as neglected bee colonies can be, and have been removed to a place where they can be nurtured.

South Cheshire Beekeepers trained the Head Gardener at Jodrell Bank in beekeeping and helped set up the apiary a few years ago. It was a popular visitor attraction with regular beekeeping displays in the summer months. Come lockdown the gardeners were furloughed and no one was allowed on site, so the bees had to look after themselves. Eventually after much tussling with bureaucracy members of the beekeeping association got access to the site to check on the bees and phew! they were still alive in their overgrown apiary.

Unfortunately, though, the gardeners who looked after the bees have been declared redundant so, even though Jodrell Bank is open to the public again, they cannot care for the bees. The once thriving and attractive apiary is sadly fast disappearing into the undergrowth but after further lengthy tussles with red tape the bees have been removed and are now being cared for by the South Cheshire Beekeepers at their apiary in Bradwall.

It was quite heavy manual labour since no vehicles were allowed to be taken beyond the main car park.



Anyway who needs bees? There will be a stunning new visitor attraction when it opens in 2021. The First Light Pavilion "will house an exhibition gallery, education areas, a projection space and a new cafe situated within the gardens at Jodrell Bank Discovery Centre."

ACTIVE TRAVEL MEASURES Holmes Chapel doesn't get a look in!



This is an abridged version of the Press Release from Cheshire East Council

"In line with government advice, Cheshire East council are implementing measures in order to improve active travel in the local area. Nine new schemes will come into effect from the 12th August 2020 as a first phase to improve routes to schools and workplaces, boost social distancing, encourage walking and cycling and improve our town centre environments. The move follows recent submissions by town and parish councils and local members of more than 500 local ideas as to what measures may work in their towns and villages"

The first nine active travel schemes, totalling investment of £155,000, will be located in **Crewe (2) Congleton—Macclesfield (2) — Wilmslow—Sandbach—Knutsford— Alsager:** The council aims to develop a further series of projects, informed by discussions with town and parish councils and ward members, that will be delivered in coming weeks, following pledged government funding of £619,000. These measures include:

Pop-up cycle lanes, with protected spaces for cycling; Measures to reduce rat-running in streets;


Improved walking and cycling routes to school;

Safer junctions, with the potential for bus and cycle-only corridors; Implementing lower speed limits; and

Wider pavements, which also enables social distancing.

Potential schemes for the Second Phase in Autumn will be located in

Wilmslow (2) - Crewe—Macclesfield—Sandbach—Congleton—Knutsford - Middlewich"

- Holmes Chapel needs Improved walking and cycling routes to schools as anyone
 trying to walk along Macclesfield Road, cross Station Road or Chester Road at the
 junction with the A50 will know. These are main A roads with through traffic and not
 town streets from which the majority of through traffic has been diverted.

UPDATE ON THE NEW TREES PLANTED IN THE DANE MEADOW




They may be difficult to spot as the surrounding vegetation has run riot in the warm wet weather, but the trees we planted in March are coming along nicely.

This young birch tree has grown its way out of the plastic sleeve, and is heading upwards, as are many of the rowan trees too.

The Friends of Dane Meadow have spent a few work sessions checking up on the trees and trying to make sure they have enough light to grow, by pulling up the nettles, thistles, willow herb etc that have sprung up around them.

Once the trees and shrubs have grown a bit more and begin to have the upper hand, they should start to shade out the anti-social weeds which should make it easier to visit and appreciate the trees.

HOLMES CHAPEL RAILWAY STATION CORNER

One of our best kept secrets!





One of our best kept secrets is the Wayfarer Ticket and here is an example:


The Station Master, Graham, sells these tickets when the booking office is open at Holmes Chapel Railway Station. He is usually there from Monday to Saturday in the mornings. If he is on leave the person in the booking office should be able to help.

I purchased this ticket and explored parts of Manchester including the Imperial War Museum of the North via train and tram on the 24th August 2020. I adhered to all the 2020 Pandemic precautions and I was pleased to witness that the railways and tramways and shops and museums are taking all necessary precautions for our safety. The ticket is available for one day and costs:

- Adult: £14.40
- Concession; £9.50 (for holders of the English National Concessionary Travel Scheme - the bus pass!) for older or disabled people.
- Child; £7.20 (for children aged 5-15 inclusive).
- Group; £28.80 (up to 2 adults and 2 children (children must be aged under 16).

Wayfarer tickets can be used on the day of purchase or purchased up to three days in advance. Apart from Graham, Wayfarers can be purchased from a variety of places including Transport for Greater Manchester Travel Shops. These tickets can be used throughout Greater Manchester and parts of Cheshire, Derbyshire, Lancashire, Staffordshire, West Yorkshire and the Peak District. The Wayfarer can be used on almost any bus, train, Metrolink tram, changing as often as you like! The Wayfarer leaflets show the area covered (shown below). The map shows the rail and Metrolink lines where you can use the tickets including the boundary for the bus services you can use. Notice that we are the last station to qualify on the Manchester to Crewe line.

Travel times - after 09:30 am Monday to Friday and all day at weekends and bank holidays. So - a perfect day out for family and friends with freedom to travel on trains, trams and buses! Further info www.tfgm.com and search for 'Wayfarer'.



There are so many places to visit - I will mention just a few: Chadkirk Chapel, Bury Transport Museum, Hope Valley, Heaton Park, the Science and Industry Museum in Manchester, Peel Tower (Holcombe), Healey Dell Nature Reserve, Bolton Town Hall, Stockport, Littleborough, the Bridgewater Canal, the Goyt Valley, the Roman Fort (Castlefield) and so on.

As I said earlier I chose to use a Wayfarer ticket to visit Manchester City Centre on the 24th, arriving at Piccadilly Railway Station from Holmes Chapel. Then down the stairs and directly on to the Metrolink at the Station to Cornbrook, changing on to the new tram line (only opening in March at the height of the Pandemic). The new tram line takes you for example) to the Imperial War Museum of the North.






Travelling by tram on the new Imperial War Museum line takes you passed the Trafford Road Bridge (which crosses the Manchester Ship Canal) and by the new Coronation Street studios and the Grade 2 listed 1902 Trafford Park Hotel.







Returning to Holmes Chapel after an interesting day out makes me glad we have access to the Wayfarer ticket and now I have shared the secret with you!



Personal Development Programme

The Prince's Trust Team programme is a 12 week personal development programme for young people aged 16 to 25.

The programme consists of:

Team building

Weeks 1 and 2 are all about getting to know each other, including a team building outward bound

Community Project

In weeks 3, 4, 5, and 6 you will fundraise for, organise and work on a project for the community.

Employability Skills

In week 7 we will help you write your CV, practice interview skills and look for employment/education.

Individual Work Experience

In weeks 8 and 9 you will attend a 2 week work experience of your choosing. Previous work experience has included M&S, the Zoo and the Nike Store.

Event planning and hosting acvities within your local community

In weeks 10 and 11 you will fundraise, organise and deliver a final team challenge for a local community group.

Final presentation

In the last week you will celebrate your achievements in a black tie presentation evening and give a speech to your family and friends.



The Prince's Trust Team Programme, delivered by Cheshire Fire and Rescue Service (CFRS) is designed to develop your skills, self confidence and motivation.

Gaining recognised qualifications will help you to gain employment or enter into further education. This is at no cost to you.

Join a team of about 15 people of similar age, both unemployed and employed.

Spend 12 weeks having fun, making new friends, helping the community and the environment.

During the course you will take part in team building activities, fund raising, work experience and a residential week.
